

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## Questions Worth Asking | Don Porter, Lead Pastor

### Why does God allow evil and suffering?

Truth must come from God and not our experiences:

God is \_\_\_\_\_ = God is the supreme authority, knowing all, working in all, and allowing nothing to happen outside of His good and perfect will.

God is \_\_\_\_\_ = God eternally gives of Himself to others. This love is active, faithful, relentless, good, and loyal.

Reconciling evil and suffering with God's attributes:

1. God allows evil and suffering because it's the result of our \_\_\_\_\_ choices.  
*Genesis 3:6-7 and Romans 8:18-21*

2. All of humanity stands guilty before God and deserves \_\_\_\_\_. *Luke 13:1-5*

Regarding our sin, the real question is, "Why does God \_\_\_\_\_ us and our \_\_\_\_\_ at all?"

3. Suffering has great \_\_\_\_\_ for us as Christians:

*Revelation 21:3-4*

- What was something in the Scripture passages or message that made an impact on you? Explain.
- Where do you see evidence of evil and suffering in the world? Where do you see evidence of the hand of God (and the sovereignty of God) in the world?
- How would you respond to someone who says, "Given the suffering in the world, either God isn't a God of love or He's not really in control!"
- Read Genesis chapter 3 and Romans 8:18-21. How do these passages help us to understand the problem of evil in light of a loving/sovereign God?
- Read Luke 13:1-5. What does this passage teach us about suffering? Have you experienced a time when your pain brought positive results?
- Read Revelation 21:1-4. What is our hope considering the reality of the suffering we will experience?
- How might you apply this sermon and Scripture passages to your life?
